Your child can sculpt a whole menagerie with a pantry staple: tinfoil!

the setup You'll need a roll of 12-inchwide aluminum foil, masking tape, Mod Podge, tissue paper, and acrylic paint. Set it up on a covered surface, and make sure your child wears a smock.

the project

Cut off a 20-inch length of foil. Make two snips 4 inches in from each side on one end; cut each into 6-inch slits. Cut a 6-inch slit in the center of the opposite side. Crush and bend each section to form a head and four legs. Add more foil for features such as a longer neck. Wrap the entire animal with short strips of masking tape, then use Mod Podge to cover it with small pieces of tissue paper. Once it's dry, paint on the details; let dry.

bonus fun

No need to stick with fourlegged friends—sculpt any critter in the animal kingdom! Roll a long piece of foil into a snake (see next page), flatten a ball into a fish's body, or add wings for a bird.
